July 20, 2022

- The proposal from Windview Athletic Fields, for the maintenance and repair of the Thornbury Park Athletic Field was approved.
- Approved waiving the Historic Resource Impact Studies for HRP # 086 at 701 Cheyney Road, and for HRP # 174 at 132 Station Road, in accordance with the Historical Commission's recommendations.
- Participating in the Salt Consortium's soliciting of bids and awarding of a contract for the purchase of road salt for the 2022-2023 season, and to also share the cost to advertise the bid was approved.

August 15, 2022

- Approved the proposal from Lawn & Golf Supply Co., Inc. for the purchase of Infield Turf Maintenance Equipment.
- Approved the Lease Agreement for Wheatly Cottage, between Thornbury Preschool, LLC, and Thornbury Township, Delaware County, for the period of September 1, 2022 through July 31, 2027.

OPEN SPACE UPDATE

There are nearly 1,000 acres of open space in Thornbury Township. That open space is comprised of land owned by Thornbury Township and dedicated to parks, publicly and privately owned open space and land owned by institutions within the township.

Recently a group of residents requested that the Park and Recreation Committee consider installing pickle ball courts, adding another active recreational opportunity to township residents. Discussions after that request have led to consideration of developing a Comprehensive Open Space/ Recreation Plan for the Thornbury Township.

Some of the first steps in developing this plan include inventorying the land we currently occupy and how it is being used as well as facilities owned privately and in surrounding municipalities. Ultimately, we

> would like to form a committee to help guide the process. Initial thoughts include participation by a diverse group of residents along with members of existing boards and commissions.

The goal is to include as many ideas and thoughts from all of our residents' in order to best develop a plan that would address a wide variety of needs, both immediate and in the future. Please consider becoming part of this process as it will likely shape the direction of recreational facilities for Thornbury Township for many years to come!

Noah taught the group about the different types of animals and insects that live in and around the stream. Using Chester Creek as his classroom, kids and parents alike got wet and explored the nature of Thornbury Township from turtle eggs and leeches to water spiders—eek! The EAC team continues with monthly trail clearings. Station Road to Locksley Road trail is now cleared and is another

great place to explore. We are thankful to the volunteers who have joined us and others who have taken an initiative to clear a downed tree from a trail. We welcome volunteers at our monthly trail clearing events and meetings.

The township has approved two new kiosks for informational and event updates. The kiosks will be installed at Barrett's Meadow and the Locksley Road parking area at Bonner Park. Thank you to Charlie Ferguson, who obtained fifty trees for the township through the Keystone Ten Million Trees Partnership. This fall we will be planting these trees on township property.

On September 11th 1777, an estimated 26,000 soldiers fought the largest land engagement battle of the American Revolution. As years go by we tend to forget where we came from and what all went thru to make this happen for us. The Historic Maps mentioned in our Summer 2022 article will be framed and hung on the walls in the Township meeting room and the Thornbury Historical Society (THS), in the Douglass Building, within the next month or so.

Four of the five Historic Resource Property (HRP) Reports for 2022 are complete. We anticipate all five to be available online and at the THS Research Library at Douglass, by year end. For 2023 we have three participants lined up and are confirming the other two who have expressed a desire. As this research program expands year over year it has gained more interest. To date we have 34 reports completed.

History is, in many ways, a story of influence of people and ideas, no matter how small the idea. One of our missions is to help preserve the historical heritage of this community. To help us fulfill that responsibility, we ask for your ideas on how we may help you. Your opinions and ideas are important. ORDINANCES:

Comprehensive Plan

At the April meeting it was reported that all chapters were fine except for #2 Population and #6 Housing, which were affected by the pandemic. Once the 2020 data is released to firm up the figures, the Planning Commission's discussion will continue.

Outdoor Dining Ordinance

An updated draft ordinance was first discussed at the March meeting and the following items were discussed: neighbor impact, water, sewer, lighting/ glare, landscape buffering, parking, and noise. The discussion continued at the April meeting and centered on accessing the outdoor dining area; music/entertainment; and shut-down time. The members recommended adoption conditioned upon the Board of Supervisors reviewing and considering various item options. At the June meeting a revised draft was reviewed and recommended for adoption by the members in accordance with the Delaware County Planning Department's staff recommendations.

Stormwater Ordinance Amendments

At the August meeting the members discussed numerous revisions, such as pet waste, impervious pavers, and riparian buffers. The members recommended adoption of these amendments in accordance with the Township Engineer's review letter.
