## Recreational Opportunities

Thornbury Township has long been blessed with supervisors who have made the preservation of open space and development of outdoor recreational space for residents a priority. Recently a group of residents attended a Park and Recreation Board meeting with a request for additional recreational options. The Park and Rec. Board forwarded that request to the Board of Supervisors. This request was very timely in that the Board of Supervisors recently received a grant to help fund a comprehensive park and open space plan. The goal is to develop a plan that will help guide the township in the development of recreational opportunities. This starts with a review of parks, open space and walking trails, and eventually the recommendation of how to further develop the prospects these spaces have to offer.

We are seeking an array of representation from the residents to form a committee. Ideally, the committee will consist of 7-9 members. Members will meet regularly for around six months and produce a living document that will act as the blueprint for future development of our outdoor recreational spaces. If you are interested in participating, we will be taking letters of interest until early October and make selections soon after the application process is closed. ## Planning Commission

Hello fellow residents,

I was thinking about you on Monday, August 7, 2023, as I sat on the tarmac in Savannah, Georgia, waiting to return to Philadelphia. I received notification earlier that heavy storms and possible tornadoes were predicted that evening in our area. My mind flashed back to Halloween night 2019. I thought about the destruction and heartache that evening's weather brought to many of our residents.

After sitting on the plane for an hour, we returned to the terminal for a two hour delay. Around 6:00pm, I was contacted by emergency personnel from Chester Heights that the storm had taken down a number of trees on Forrest Hills Drive and severely damaged one home. My fears had been realized. Fortunately, we have a very thorough Emergency Management Plan and a super team of township staff, volunteers, and professionals. I knew we were prepared to deal with the aftermath, but I wanted to be there to help with the response.

As many of you have probably noticed, our weather pattern has changed, and not for the better. This, combined with many diseased trees, has been the recipe for damaged homes, road closures, and loss of both power and communication lines. We continuously remind residents to be prepared for these situations. The township maintains a list of residents that may have special needs during emergency responses. This information is shared with first responders and enables them to be best prepared should that residence require attention. In closing, I would like to leave you with a couple of thoughts to ponder. Do you have an emergency plan? Have you registered anyone in your household that may require special assistance during an event? Do you have trees that should be removed because of their health or proximity to your home? We encourage you to create a plan before an emergency strikes so you and your loved ones are as prepared as possible. Tr

## Planning Commission

#### 40 Broomall Lane

Goodman Sketch Plan for Multiple Additions
At the June meeting Mr. Goodman
proposed a 50 ft. by 50 ft. steel
building to be used for storage. The
discussion centered around stormwater
requirements, septic, and front yard
setback requirements due to having two
street fronts. Discussion will resume upon
receipt of preliminary plans.

#### 168 Stoney Bank Road

O'Connor, Preliminary/Minor Land Development Plan

This project proposes to subdivide about 4,000 sq. ft. of land from a neighbor's five|acre parcel into Mr. O'Connor's parcel. This subdivision was needed due to an addition that was added which extended into the rear yard setback for an accessory structure. This plan submittal includes land development because the total square footage of the proposed garage exceeds the 1,000 sq. ft. maximum. The garage is intended for

storage. Discussion involved steep slopes, a concrete wall, stone washing onto Stoney Bank Rd., landscaping/tree requirements, and driveway sight distance. Discussion will resume upon receipt of revised plans.

#### 282 & 286 Dilworthtown Road

VMDT, Preliminary Reverse Subdivision and Land Development Plan
The discussion continued at the July meeting. Topics included deed restrictions, lighting requirements, vehicle/truck circulation, parking, and stormwater management. At the conclusion of the meeting, the members recommended preliminary approval conditioned upon compliance with the Township's engineer's review comments. Discussion will resume upon receipt of final plans.



# BOARD OF HEALTH CORNER

We hope everyone is having a fun, safe summer and are enjoying vacations and outdoor activities. The Thornbury Township Board of Health has been meeting on a regular schedule and would like to make a suggestion to those residents who have complicated medical conditions. One of the biggest problems that EMS services has to deal with in the setting of a medical emergency is not being able to get a person's medical history or medication list. Patients are often unable to speak for themselves or they are too upset, or their family/ caregiver are too upset, to answer questions. Healthcare workers not being able to have this information in a timely manner can prevent or delay crucial treatment.

There is a product called **The Vial of Life** which we would suggest anyone with complicated medical problems consider obtaining. It consists of a form that you will complete that will contain medical history, medication list, and allergies. It can also contain insurance information and people to notify. The form is then folded and placed in a provided vial. A sticker stating what it contains is then placed on it and it is put in the refrigerator either on the top shelf or the condiment shelf. A decal is then placed on the outside of the refrigerator notifying EMS that the information is present.

EMS personnel are trained to look for this. Some people also put a second one in the glove box of their car. It is available at www.vialoflife.com site and also on Amazon.

## Historical Commission Letter

"WHEN THE WELL IS DRY, WE WILL KNOW THE WORTH OF WATER" - BEN FRANKLIN

#### God Bless America ...

The link at the end of the article will take you to a video showing the very first public singing of "God Bless America." The history is interesting.

The time was 1940. America was in a terrible economic depression. A time

of hardship and worry for most. Hitler was taking over Europe and Americans were afraid we'd have to go to war.

Being the era just before TV, radio shows were HUGE. In the evenings, American families sat around their radios, listening to their favorite entertainers. No

entertainer of that era was bigger than Kate Smith. Kate Smith might not have made it big in the age of TV but with her voice coming over the radio, she was the biggest star of her time.

Kate, being very patriotic, was hurt to see Americans so depressed and afraid of what the next day would bring. She had hope for America and faith in her fellow Americans. She wanted to do something to cheer them up, so she went to the famous American songwriter Irving Berlin (who also wrote White Christmas) and asked him to write a song that would make Americans feel good again about their country. When Kate described what she was looking for, Irving knew he had just the song in his files; one he had written but never published, 22 years before – in 1917.

With song in hand, she and her studio orchestra set to work. Kate and Irving Berlin were not sure how the song would be received by the public, but both agreed they would not take any profits from God Bless America. Any profits would go to the Boy Scouts of America. Over the years, the Boy Scouts have received millions of dollars in royalties from this song.

This video starts out with Kate Smith coming into the radio studio with the orchestra and an audience. She introduces the new song for the very first time and starts singing. After the first couple of verses, with her voice in the background, scenes are shown from the 1940

movie, You're In The Army Now. At the 4:20 mark of the video you see a young actor in the movie, sitting in an office, reading a paper; it's Ronald Reagan.

To this day, God Bless America stirs our patriotic feelings and pride in our country. Back in 1940, when Kate Smith went looking for a song to raise the spirits of her fellow Americans, it is doubtful whether she realized just how successful the results would be for her fellow Americans during those years of hardship and worry... and for many generations of Americans to follow. Many people don't

know there's a lead into the song since it usually starts with God Bless America. Here is the entire song as originally sung.
