Having grown up in the vicinity, Geoff has always loved Thornbury. He became an active member of the Thornbury Historical Society and served on the Historical Commission. While serving as the Chairman of the HC, the Thornton Village Historic District was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2006. In 2009, Geoff began his career as the Municipal Secretary to the Board of Supervisors.

After 15 years of service, he has decided to pass the baton. This marks the end of an era for the Township. In his tenor here he has recorded over 300 Supervisors Meeting Minutes and guided countless developers and residents through the process of Land Development in Thornbury Township. One of his talents is to explain, in great detail, exactly what needs to be done, down to where you should park your car and what door you should use when going to the Courthouse to record your plans.

Township Manager Letter

Hello fellow residents. As I am writing this letter to you, we are recovering from some very difficult storms that found several of our roads unpassable and many residents without electricity and other utilities. I thought it would be helpful to pass along some information for these kinds of situations.

First and foremost, please do not enter an area with downed wires. Although a road may appear passable because a tree or branch is “just” hung up, it is still a dangerous proposition. The wires may be “live” and therefore the risk of electrocution is serious. We typically get cones and barriers up quickly to alert drivers of road closures. Additionally, our policy has been to update our website and social media of road closures. Please do not go through the barriers.

People often assume that the utility companies are aware of their outage. In many cases they are, but some interruptions of service are not as evident to these companies. Each of the utility companies has emergency or customer service phone numbers. We would


suggest keeping those numbers handy along with your account numbers for ease of communication once you reach the respective utility. During the storm that caused some of the more recent flooding, first responders performed a water rescue in our township. I know we hear it all the time, but do not enter an area where roads are submerged. Flash floods can go quickly from dangerous to deadly.

Finally, please assess the condition of the trees that are on your property. The blight of several species in our area has caused deterioration of vegetation that often is the root cause of downed wires and closed streets. Unfortunately, folks sometimes think it is better to wait for Penn DOT or one of the utility companies to address trees in the right of way. They do not own the trees, we as residents own them. Thus, it is our responsibility to take care of problematic vegetation on our own property before it becomes an issue for all of our community. *T*

DIGITAL SIGN AT THORNBURY PARK

In January we had a digital sign installed at Thornbury Park along Glen Mills Road. This sign has many benefits. The township can manage the information and post it remotely. We can quickly and easily change the content, so you can get real time updates on what is going on in the Township. For example, we can post a road closure or a cancelled meeting. This information can easily be seen from your car. We have the options of using graphics and animations in addition to words. Another great feature of the new sign is it is less bright than the previous sign, so as not to disrupt the rural setting in which it resides. We are always looking for ways to improve our services and communication with the residents.



BULK TRASH PICK-UP SCHEDULE

You must register and pay for a pick-up or your bulk trash will not be picked up. Bulk trash must be on your curb the night before. Haulers will not make a second trip. No refunds. Board Chairman Letter

RECENT BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ACTIONS

November 1, 2023

- The Historical Commission recommended year-end contributions of \$250.00 each to the ALS Association of Greater Philadelphia Chapter, in memory of Mark Kelly, the Chester County History Center, for National History Day Registration Fees, the Pennsylvania Colonial Plantation Farm's Animal Fund, the Delaware County Historical Society's Children's Educational Center, the Delaware County Veterans Memorial Hall of Prayers, the Sanderson Museum, to be used to digitize and preserve audio tapes and films, for a total cost of \$1,500.00, with funds from their 2023 HC Budget, was approved.
- Authorizing the Township Solicitor to prepare an Ordinance Amendment for a Public Hearing, adding parking prohibitions in certain areas, in accordance with the Thornbury Township Code of Ordinance Chapter 15, Article 303, was approved.

December 6, 2023

- Approved a donation of \$750.00 from the Thornbury Township EAC to the CRC Watersheds Association, in support of the 2024 Annual Stream Cleanup, with funds from their 2024 budget.

In January Lucy Weaver was sworn into office as our 14th Junior Supervisor. Lucy is a Senior at Bayard Rustin High School. We instituted the Junior Supervisor program in 2013 and have thoroughly enjoyed meeting these great students. They are impressive. I think we have learned more from them than they have from us. Downed Power Lines

Be aware of hazards presented by downed power lines. Your life or the life of someone else depends on it.

Never Touch a Downed Power Line

- Never touch anything or anyone in contact with a power line. You could be shocked by contact with the line or a secondary object or person. When a live wire touches the ground, electricity fans out through the ground, like when a pebble hits water. You could be shocked when around a downed power line. The minimum safe distance from a downed power line is 35 feet.
- Consider all wires energized and dangerous. Even de-energized lines may become energized at any time.
- Stay at least 35 feet away from downed lines.
- Electricity can travel through the ground, fences, hoses, and playscapes. A live wire, either on the ground or in trees, can harm you, even if you don't



- directly touch the line.
- Electricity can also travel through tree limbs. Never remove tree limbs or other items touching or near a downed wire. Call PECO 1-800-841-4141 to report the tree limb.
- Never use any object to move a downed wire.
- Rubber gloves and rubber-soled shoes will not protect you from electrocution.

Do not try to rescue someone who contacts a downed power line. You risk becoming a victim yourself. Call 911. 

SHOVEL YOUR SIDEWALKS

Hopefully by the time you are reading this newsletter, we won't have to worry about snow until next winter. This past January we had a few storms that affected our township and we observed quite a few houses that cleared their driveways but not the sidewalks in front of their homes. That poses a danger for your neighbors as they walk their dogs or their children to the bus stop. Please keep this in mind for next year. *§ 21-201 Clearing of Sidewalks Required. [Ord. 10-1995, 11/6/1995, § 53; as amended by Ord. 1-2007, 9/19/2007, § 1] It shall be the duty of all property owners, agents, tenants or occupants of occupied properties and the property owners or agents in charge of unoccupied properties, in the Township of Thornbury, not later than 24 hours after snow or sleet has ceased to fall, to clear or cause to be cleared a pathway in the sidewalk adjacent, abutting or servicing their respective properties and to cover the sidewalk with salt or other ice melting materials in the event of ice or sleet. Such pathway shall not be less than 36 inches in width and shall be thoroughly cleared of snow and/or ice and covered with salt or other ice melting materials. In the event snow and ice is removed from the pathway it may be placed or piled on the curbside of the sidewalk but in no event shall it be piled or placed in the gutter or the cartway.*

BUILDING PERMITS WITH CLOUDPERMIT

Apply for a building permit online! We are now using a cloud-based software called Cloudpermit so you can complete the entire building permit process online on any mobile device. With Cloudpermit, you can:

- Apply for building permits at any time, from anywhere.
- Check the status of your building permit or building inspection (*when your application status changes, you'll automatically receive an email letting you know*)
- Schedule or cancel building inspections.
- Communicate with your building department with time-stamped messages.
- Pay for your building permit with a credit card.
- Request and submit changes to an existing building permit.

WAYS TO PAY YOUR PUBLIC SEWER BILL

If you would like to pay your Public Sewer Bill via credit card, auto pay, or pre-pay, read below for some options:

Online Bill Pay via your banking institution:

Most banks offer free online bill pay services with your checking account. You can go in each quarter and manually pay the bill online or set up auto-pay. If setting up auto-pay, bills are paid quarterly and are due on the following dates: February 15, May 15, August 15 and November 15.

Pay ahead:

Many residents would prefer not to write out a check four times a year. You can pay a quarter ahead, a year ahead, or more! Any amount you choose, and your account will be credited accordingly, so that when you receive your sewer bill, the amount due will show “No Payment Due.”

Pay via credit card:

Please be aware that there is a service charge for credit card payments. To pay with a credit card access the Municipipay Payment Portal (Link available on Township website. Hover over “Sewer” and click “Sewer Rent & Loan Online Payment Processing”). Enter the property address for which you are making a sewer rent payment (\$145/quarter). Enter remaining information and submit your payment
*CC Fees: Minimum fee of \$3.00 or 2.65% per transaction. (\$3.84 for \$145 payment)

Thornbury Township Historical Commission Logo



The origins of our Historical Commission’s logo (above)
There are ten properties in “Beautiful Downtown Thornton” bearing this logo. With the Board of Supervisor’s permission, in 2009 the HC initiated a program to recognize the nine major historic resources properties (HRP), and their owners, in our Thornton Village Historic District. These nine had been placed on the National Register of Historic Places by the United States Department of Interior. Links can be found on the HC page of the Township website. Concurrently, the HC was designing the town center sign to bring public awareness to our Village’s businesses and designing the HC logo. The logo was designed to complement the Township seal. Yellow House, being the most prominent HRP in the Village, led us to ask township resident, Kristina Fennelly, if she would design a Yellow House logo. Kris agreed to volunteer, and the logo was completed in mid-2009. That same year the town center sign was designed and in May of 2011, at the Thornbury Historical Society’s annual dinner, the THS and the HC presented a tastefully designed dark green and bronze plaque to each of the nine HRP owners. Those plaques and the Town Center sign comprise the ten properties mentioned above.
